An overview of the presidential transition process and significant events that occur after Election Day

Presidential transitions are designed to ready officials and agencies to govern by inauguration

Presidential transitions are significant undertakings

> Transition teams help incoming presidents staff agencies and implement their agenda

Transition teams are responsible for:

- Vetting candidates for over 4,000 presidential appointments, of which 1,200 require Senate confirmation
- · Recommending staffing decisions to the presidential candidate
- · Coordinating with the outgoing administration
- · Learning about how over 100 agencies function
- Applying knowledge of federal agencies to help the president effectively implement their agenda
- Outgoing administrations are expected to cooperate on the transition

The Presidential Transition Act of 1963 requires the outgoing administration to coordinate the transition:

- The White House must create a Transition Coordination Council of senior administration officials six months before the election;
- The General Services Administration (GSA) must provide office space and funding for coordination with transition teams
- GSA is also expected to mediate between the transition teams and the outgoing administration



What is a presidential transition?

The structured process that equips an incoming administration with the knowledge and resources needed for the president to lead effectively from their first day in office

Transitions have practical and symbolic implications

- Effective transitions ensure that the new administration is fully prepared to manage natural disasters, international issues, and national security threats from day one
- The US has peacefully transferred power between executives for over 200 years, encouraging outgoing and incoming administrations to work together



2024 presidential transition recommended timeline

SPRING 2024

Candidates make initial preparations

SUMMER 2024

Name and announce transition chairs and senior leadership

Transition teams identify a strategy

- Implement timelines for appointments and create work plans
- Establish a standard agency review reporting system
- Form budget and fundraising plans
- · Begin coordinating with GSA on funding and office space

FALL 2024

Begin policy planning and identifying staff

- Pinpoint policy priorities for the next administration
- Begin the security clearance process for transition officials who receive classified information
- Begin vetting personnel options and compiling lists of candidates
- Establish agency review teams
- Coordinate with the Senate on upcoming confirmations

WINTER 2024


Begin making appointments and nominations

- Scale and roll out agency review teams
- Get documents ready for transfer to agencies and receive information from outgoing agency leaders
- Set plans for cabinet retreat and agency orientation

SPRING 2025

Fill remaining vacancies

Ensure Senate confirms remaining 400 officials





Cabinet vetting begins months before the election


Sourcing

- Former administration officials
- Campaign staff
- NGO & business leaders
- Well-known political officials

Nomination

- President and 4-5 key advisors will formally send nomination to Senate
- Finished within a month of election

Vetting



- Deep vetting begins post-election
- · FBI background checks finished pre-Senate hearings
- Process begins in August of election year



Confirmation




- Nomination is passed to the proper Senate committee
- · Senate holds hearings on whether to confirm the nomination
- Simply majority needed to confirm a nominee

Appointment

- · President presents a signed commission to the nominee
- · Appointee is sworn in to faithfully execute the duties of their position









The Biden administration is cooperating with the Trump transition team

Biden and Harris promised a peaceful transfer of power following election loss

- Harris stated during her November 6 concession speech at Howard University that the administration will assist the Trump transition team with a peaceful transfer of power
- President Biden said the administration will work toward "a peaceful and orderly transition," during remarks in the Rose Garden
- President Biden and President-elect Trump are scheduled to meet in the Oval Office on Wednesday, November 13



TRANSITION OUTLOOK

- Biden administration officials overseeing the transition believe Trump will formally accept assistance from the administration on the transition
- A Trump transition team spokesperson reported that attorneys for the transition team "continue to constructively engage with the Biden-Harris administration lawyers regarding all agreements contemplated by the Presidential Transition Act"
- Experts caution that while signing the memorandum isn't mandatory, declining the administration's assistance could hinder Trump's ability to govern effectively upon taking office
