Major tariff announcement on April 2

next Wednesday (April 2) for each country targeted. It is unclear whether the U.S. will impose the tariffs immediately or create a process that gives time for the U.S. to make country-specific deals. Tariffs for Venezuelan oil and gas purchases: The President

has announced a new tariff on products from any country that buys oil

and gas from Venezuela. This follows the administration's actions against

alleged Venezuelan gang members in the U.S. • **Potential targets**: China, the largest importer of Venezuelan crude oil. Other countries that import Venezuelan crude oil include 💌 Vietnam, ጆ Spain, 🔀 Cuba, 鬥 Singapore, 🕮 Malaysia, 📦 Russia, India, and the Dominican Republic.

• **Tell me more**: Unlike many of the emergency tariff actions, this

order provides a lot of flexibility. The date is "on or after" April 2.

Also, the President is giving Secretary of State Marco Rubio discretion to decide whether to impose the tariffs on goods from certain countries. 

The uppers and soles are rubber/plastic (R/P). • **Takeaway**: One version of the footwear has long cleats and is classified as sports footwear in 6402.19.15 (5.1%)(4A). The second version does not have cleats and falls in 6402.99.31 (6%). Read more. **MY N345604 (February 21, 2025)** • **Footwear**: girl's leather boots. The R/P soles and heels incorporate wedges that promote the outward rotation of the foot. On that basis,

- goes on to classify the shoe in 6402.99.79 (90 cents per pair + 37.5%). • **Two more things \(\delta\)**: CBP rejected the importer's classification suggestion, 6402.99.31, because the textile collar makes up more than 10% of the external surface of the upper (ESAU). There is also


